Make a Bird Feeder!

Acmhainní:

Cartán bainne, Siosúr, Sreangán, Péint déanta as sméara, Scuab phéinteála, Uisce, Cupán in-athúsáidte, Síolta, Im piseanna talún, Cipín

Céimeanna:

- Bailigh cartán bainne atá folamh, glan amach le huisce é agus lig dó triomú.
- Go cúramach, gearr oscailt dhronuilleogach le siosúr ar thaobh amháin den chartán, agus fág spás do na héin chun na síolta a aimsiú.
- Maisigh an cartán bainne le péint déanta as sméara.
- Ansin, cuir poll ag bun an chartáin faoin oscailt agus cuir cipín anseo mar shuíochán do na héin.
- Déan poll eile ag barr an chartáin agus cuir an sreangán tríd an bpoll chun é a chrocadh agus ceangail go daingean é.

Tascanna breise!

Is féidir leis na páistí dialann a choinneáil agus breathnóireacht a dhéanamh ar na héin agus aon ainmhí eile a fheiceann siad. D'fhéadfadh siad píosa scríbhneoireachta a dhéanamh faoi na héin nó pictiúir a tharraingt. Chomh maith leis sin, is féidir leo nóta a scríobh faoi cé chomh minic is a thugann na héin cuairt ar an mbeathadán éan.

Éin a fheicfidh na páistí timpeall na hÉireann:

·Spideog, Gealbhan binne, Druid, Lon dubh



You will need:

Milk carton, Scissors, String, Paint made from Berries, Paint brushes, Water, Reusable cup, Seeds, Peanut butter and a Twig.

Stens:

- ·Gather an empty milk carton from home, clean it out using water and then let it dry.
- ·Using a scissors, carefully cut a rectangular opening on one side of the milk carton, leaving enough space for the birds to access the seeds.
- Decorate the carton with colourful designs using paint made from berries.
- ·Next, poke a hole through the bottom of the milk carton, under the opening and insert a twig here for the birds to rest on.
- Poke another hole, but at the top of the milk carton, and thread a piece of string through this hole for hanging and tie it securely.
- ·Add the seeds to the open part of the milk carton peanut butter may be used to keep the seeds in place.
- ·Finally, hang your bird feeder in an elevated area outdoors and watch the magic happen.

Bonus tasks!

Children could keep a journal and make observations of the birds they see. The children could write about these birds or draw pictures of them. They could make a note about how often the birds visit and how soon the bird feeders need to be refilled. Check out this simple <u>spotter sheet</u> to help you identify some common garden birds.

- ·Robin
- ·House-sparrow
- ·Starling
- ·Blackbird

Role: Biodiversity Officer, Kildare County Council (Local Authority in Ireland)

AN OVERVIEW OF YOUR JOB:

My job is to create a plan for Kildare that helps protect nature and all the amazing plants and animals around us. I work with others in the council to make sure we look after biodiversity, like doing surveys to see what wildlife we already have. I also support local groups who are protecting nature in their communities. This helps Kildare be part of the bioeconomy, where nature and people work together for a better future!



I am usually based in the Kildare County Council Offices but also spend some time out and about meeting with community groups, researchers etc.

I love the variety of work I get to do.


I get to meet and work with lots of different and interesting people.

I could be out running an event, meeting a group, developing a proposal or in a meeting. One of my favourite things about my role is the variety. It is really enjoyable to get to do lots of different things and work with lots of different people.



HOW DID YOU GET INTO THIS CAREER?



I loved nature, animals and being outdoors and started studying Science. One thing led to another!

YOU GIVE TO A YOUNG PERSON INTERESTED IN THIS CAREER PATH?

Park your shyness! People are kind and helpfulgive them a call! Go to as many events, talks, conferences etc as you can. Take all the opportunities on offer!

Follow your interests that bring you joy! But also, don't be afraid to have multiple interests. The pursuit of one, can facilitate a deeper dive into another at a later time. For example, a love of maths, art or business may be handy later on!

WHAT WORK EXPERIENCE, QUALIFICATIONS OR TRAINING HELPED YOU?

I started off with a degree in Science, specialising in Zoology. I had lots of early (and unpaid) jobs! I worked in a bird observatory, in FOTA wildlife park and Dublin Zoo. All of these small jobs led to another and eventually to a PhD in Chough Research. This was amazing experience looking at this rare crow and learning about its behaviours.



BESIDES FORMAL QUALIFICATIONS, WHAT SKILLS OR TRAITS ARE MOST USEFUL FOR YOUR TYPE OF WORK?

There are lots of skills which are really important in my current job. Some of these skills are things which I learned in some of my earliest roles so make sure you bring your past knowledge and experience with you as you grow into new roles!

- Being a good communicator and the ability to explain complicated issues and concepts.
- Working as part of a team and being able to collaborate with others in different disciplines.
- Thinking long term and planning for the future. You need to be able to map out a project, potentially years in advance!

My experience of the Kekri Harvest Festival in Finland

Hi, my name is Kate. Back in October of this year, I went to Finland. I was volunteering in a town called Nurmes in North Karelia. The main goal of the programme was to interact with and educate the locals about a traditional festival called Kekri. Kekri was a traditional harvest festival which died out in the 1900s and became somewhat forgotten. During my time there, I also learned how to make a traditional fence completely out of wood.

Finnish people are very resourceful, as I learned they love nature and go foraging for seasonal fruit and mushrooms. During the war, they made flour out of tree bark when wheat was scarce. We also learned how to survive in the wilderness using the natural resources of the forest. It made me think a lot about a bioeconomy.



There were other volunteers too from different countries such as Portugal, France, Spain, Italy, Germany, Hungary, Bulgaria, Ukraine, Colombia and Lebanon. I was able to go on this trip thanks to the European Union and ERASMUS. Anyone who is a citizen of the EU and between the ages of 18 and 30 can volunteer abroad. They fund your travel expenses and give you an allowance for essential things like food. At the end, you receive a Youth Pass certificate which you can put on your CV.

BioBeo Christmas Glossary using Al



This Christmas, we are getting creative and using AI to produce fun images and text to help us better understand and share terms and ideas related to the Bioeconomy. Check out the image on the right which illustrates the term "Environmental Footprint" with the example of sustainable packaging. This is a simple and fun activity you can try at home!

Here is how it works!

Step 1: Pick a term from the BioBeo Glossary. For the next example we picked "Sustainable Farming and Forestry"

Step 2: Use Chat GPT or another AI platform to enter a prompt to describe the image you want. It can be any kind of text, a question or information about the term. We said "Root system network of trees and fungi which phone each other using the internet inside the tree, and mobile phones"

Step 3: Admire your creation! Does the image really show what you were hoping for?

Our challenge to you is to use any AI platform to create an image for the term "Eco Friendly". Use any prompt you like to describe this idea. Find instructions on YoutTube on creating images using AI. You can give an example of an eco-friendly practice, an animal or place you wish to include. You could say- a fox using a reusable water bottle in the forest- use your imagination! Send us the images you get back and the prompts you used to office@biobeo.eu and we might feature your image on the website or in the next newsletter!
